#### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

#### SUNDAY IN KENNINGTON

Sunday last being the Feast Day at Kennington, a Village near this City, Country People when had assembled in the Afternoon for the usual sport of Wrestling and Backsword Playing, a Dispute happened between one Earle and a person known at these diversions as Hen-Toe. The Affront was occasioned by Earle's telling Hen-Toe that he was not Man enough for the Business he had undertaken, which was whipping out in the Ringing. Upon this they agreed to decide their Manhood by Battle and accordingly stripped and went to it by the Water Side; but after fighting about six or seven Minutes, finding the Crowd press them to much, they crossed the Isis with each his Second, and on the other side fought One and Twenty Minutes more, when Hen-Toe was obliged to give out; and we hear he is since dead.

It is thought 'whipping out in the Ringing' was having a fight in a circle of Spectators - unless you know better?

Backsword play originally involved duelling with one-sided blades; but on this occasion probably meant no more than using sticks.

What about Kennington's Feast Day? - as the JOJ was published on Saturdays it must have been either the 1st August 1762 or close to 25th July 1762

#### KENNINGTON ARREST

On Saturday last a Supervisor and three Officers of Excise seized seven bags of tea, and ten Half Anchors of Brandy with the cart on which they were loaded, on a ground near Kennington Common, about a mile from this City.


#### **RAILWAY HISTORY**
